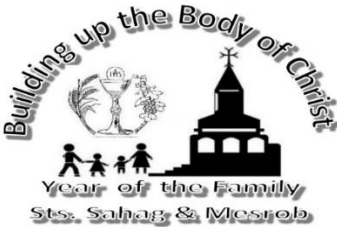

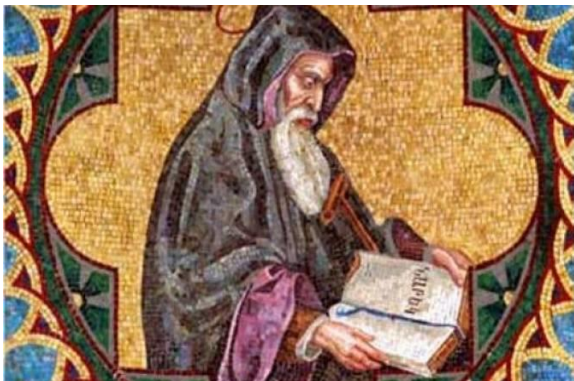
From Today's Readings

Mark 11:27-33 The chief priests, teachers of the law, and elders question the authority of Jesus, who had angered them once again by evicting the moneychangers and vendors at the Temple. *Discuss/reflect: In what ways do you question Jesus' authority? How does your life reflect that you truly believe He governs your life?*

2 Corinthians 13:5-13 St. Paul tells the believers of Corinth that even if they feel he has failed them, he prays for their righteousness. He is happy to appear weak if it means that they are strong in their faith. "Aim for perfection," he tenderly advises, and "the God of love and peace will be with you." *Discuss/reflect: What model of virtue does St. Paul offer us in our attitudes to those we serve who criticize us? What might aiming for perfection look like in your life?*

Isaiah 17:7-14 Isaiah prophecies against Syria and Israel, whose people have forgotten God. As a result, no human effort can be fruitful. *Discuss/reflect: In these difficult times, how might the image of verse 13 together with the story of Jesus' calming of the sea (Mark 4:35-41) be sources of comfort and strength?*

Saturday, October 12, is the Feast of the Holy Translators



Philosopher, Gregory of Narek, Nersess the Grace-filled These well-known saints are remembered on other days of the church calendar year, but the Armenian Church remembers them here specifically as "translators," those who enlighten others about our faith through prayers, hymns, poetry, philosophy and even history. Translation goes beyond rendering one language into another. It is the sharing of the experience of Christ with His people, to those who will also become translators for His Church.

St. Gregory of Narek (c 945-1003) was a beloved teacher, churchman and prolific writer. Born in Narek (near Lake Van) he entered the monastery there and wrote Bible commentaries, history and deeply affecting prayers. His renowned collection *Speaking with God from the Depths of My Heart* was so treasured that it was thought to have healing powers. This Sunday begin class with one of his prayers (from Prayer 29): "You alone are great and generous in everything./You are the definition of abundant goodness/who pours forth constantly without measure,/more than we ask or expect."

Reflection: How, in my life, do I "pour forth without measure"?

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
